

FROM THE DESK OF FATHER ANTHONY

Beloved in Christ, in the month of July, we celebrate the memory of various saints considered to be divine agents of miraculous healings for those who call upon them in faith. These are, Sts. Cosmas and Damian of Rome (7/1), St. Paraskevi (7/26) and St. Panteleimon (7/27).

The Holy Unmercenaries, Cosmas and Damian of Rome, are a different pair than the more well-known pair from Asia Minor, whose memory is celebrated on November 1st (there is also a third pair from Arabia, celebrated on October 17th). In all cases, these saints were trained physicians of the body, but more importantly, they were physicians of the *soul*. The other important aspect of their lives, was their insistence on not charging for their services. They took to heart the commandment of Christ to the Disciples: "*Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out demons. Freely you have received, freely give.*" (*Mt. 10:8*). All they wanted in return for their services, was for the patient to confess and believe in Christ; and this readily happened, since many of the healings received were miraculous in nature, and not the result of the science of medicine. Unfortunately, the notoriety of Sts. Cosmas and Damian in Roman society eventually led to their martyrdom.

St. Paraskevi was a saintly young girl born of pious Christian parents, who led a monastic life. Through her missionary zeal, she guided many to Christ. As was typical during the time of Roman persecution, she was arrested and asked to denounce Christ and worship the idols. She staunchly refused, which led to cruel tortures. The final torture was to place her in a vat of boiling oil which did her no harm. In fact, the emperor questioned whether she had cast some sort of magic spell on the oil to make it as cool as water. To answer him, she scooped some of the hot oil in her hands and threw it out of the cauldron, some of which splashed into his eyes and blinded him. He pleaded to her for mercy, which she granted by praying for him and healing his eyes. The emperor was profoundly moved, and therefore ceased the persecution of Christians throughout the empire. His successor, however, began a new wave of persecutions, during which St. Paraskevi was finally beheaded. Because of the healing of the emperor's eyes, she has subsequently been called upon by the faithful over the centuries, for the health of the eyes.

St. Panteleimon was also a trained physician and unmercenary (would not take money for his services). Although a proficient physician, his healings were based on the grace of God more than medicines. One of his greatest miracles became the cause of his martyrdom. He had healed a blind man by calling upon the name of Jesus, and simultaneously opened the eyes of the man's soul to the true God. When questioned about

the healing, the man formerly blind boldly confessed the entire story, very much like the man born blind who was healed by Christ. The man was immediately put to death, and St. Panteleimon was arrested and later beheaded.

The lives of these great healers and martyrs speak loudly of unwavering faith in Christ. They believed without a doubt, that He truly can do those things which are impossible for men. Countless faithful over the ages, have called upon these and many other healing saints for their intercessions and assistance. The Church still produces healing saints who, in this life, had the same unwavering faith as the martyrs described above. St. Nektarios, as many know, is a modern saint of the 20th century who is a great miracle worker for the sick. Here in the United States, we also have St. John of Shanghai and San Francisco who is a great source of healing for countless of the faithful. One of our Greek Archdiocesan priests who had been in the San Francisco Bay Area, had various healings occur with members of his flock, who prayed to St. John with great faith in God and His saints.

May we too may gain unwavering faith as a result of the efforts of our continued spiritual growth. When we need help in our lives when any numbers of problems arise, we cannot simply be passive and hope that God may hear our feeble prayer. We need to live our Orthodox Christian lives in a very *real* and *substantial* manner. Let us all turn to the Church with renewed fervor if we have become lukewarm. Let us call upon all the saints and the holy Theotokos for their continued prayers and intercessions. They care about us — let us show them our love, respect, and gratitude by honoring them at their feast days celebrated throughout the year, and through our fervent prayers to them.

FROM THE HOLY FATHERS

(The following is taken from <u>Themes From the Philokalia</u>, <u>No. 1: Watchfulness and Prayer</u>, by Archimandrite Ioannikios, Light and Life Publishing Co., 1988)

"Pray unceasingly with the all-powerful Name of Jesus, the sweet Name, the myrrh of heaven... You can pray unceasingly no matter what you are doing, wherever you are, everywhere and always: at home, at work, on the road, at mealtime, on the bus, on foot, day and night. This prayer insures you a day 'holy, perfect, peaceful and sinless.' It disperses 'the light of Christ' in the path of your life. It perfumes your being with 'the fragrance of Christ'...

St. Symeon of Thessalonica writes: 'Let, therefore, every devout Christian say the "prayer" (Jesus prayer) unceasingly with the mind and lips..." All of us, clergy, laity, monastics, must bring Christ to our minds first, as soon as we awake from our sleep. Let us offer to Him the beginning of all our thoughts like a morning sacrifice. It is natural, before anything else, to think of Jesus, Who saved us and Who loves us so much!...

Our era is characterized by worry, anxiety, neuroses, confusion, the domination of the machine and technology, which press hard upon the life of the heart. Materialism, nihilism, individualism, cruelty, 'death of God,' death of love, condemnation of spiritual life, absorption by the carnal 'I,' thirst for worldly knowledge and glory, disdain for spiritual knowledge, forgetfulness of the divine image of man: all these have turned contemporary men into walking question marks moving in an impassable chaos. But if Jesus is the only true peace for all times, He is especially for our time. Prayer in the Name of Jesus becomes more imperative today. Christ even today proclaims: 'My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you.'

If we had made Christ the life of every moment, with unceasing prayer, and if we sought Him incessantly with ardent zeal, then so many hours would not be spent uselessly in vain thoughts, in materialistic conversations and sinful acts, which increase the anxiety and 'worldly cares' and remove us from the divine harbor of His peace."
