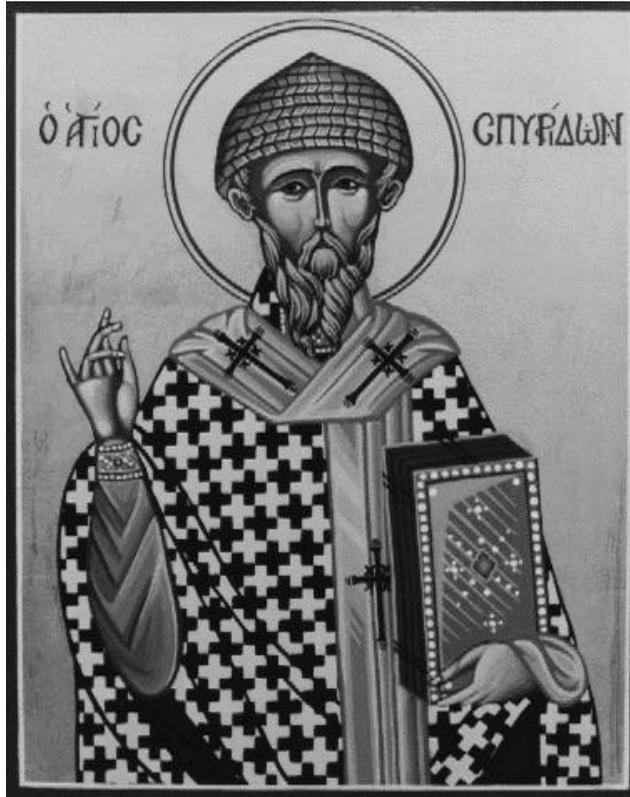

FROM THE DESK OF FATHER ANTHONY

Beloved in Christ, as we all know well, the life of an Orthodox Christian is an upward struggle. During this month of September, in which we celebrate the exaltation of the Precious Cross (9/14), we remind ourselves each year of the cross that we all bear on our path toward salvation. September is also the beginning of the new ecclesiastical year, so therefore, it is a time of spiritual renewal as we pause on our journey, and gather strength to carry our cross in faith. This journey cannot be taken alone, for if we attempt to, we will fail. As Orthodox Christians, we know that we cannot “go it alone,” but only through the Church of Christ, through which salvation has come into the world.

Even though we all know in *theory*, the importance of the Church in our lives, in *practice*, our approach can vary greatly. Many of us are not familiar with what the Holy Canons of the Church have to say regarding church attendance, especially on Sundays. Here is the text of the actual canon: “*In case any Bishop, or Presbyter, or Deacon, or anyone else on the list of the Clergy, or any layman, without any graver necessity or any particular difficulty compelling him to absent himself from his own church for a very long time, fails to attend church on Sundays for three consecutive weeks, while living in the city, if he be a Cleric, let him be deposed from office; but if he be a layman, let him be removed from Communion.*” (Canon 80 of the 102 canons of the Sixth Ecumenical Council).

In the interpretation of this canon, a strong statement is made regarding this situation...“*for one of two things must be true: either such a person is not a believer; or, though a believer, he scorns the common offering of hymns and prayers to God.*” (*The Rudder (Pedalion) of the Orthodox Church*, Pg. 385, The Orthodox Christian Educational Society, 1957).

Obviously, the Church does not uphold this canon in the strictest sense (although, it could regarding clergy). However, as with all the canons, they should be upheld *in their spirit*. In other words, the Church cannot condone voluntarily absence from Sunday liturgy when no hardship is involved, so therefore, Orthodox Christians have a sacred obligation to worship together at each Sunday’s divine liturgy. Additionally, again in the spirit of the canon, one should not automatically come to Holy Communion upon deciding to attend church after long and unnecessary absences. This type of situation is an example of necessary items to be confessed to one’s priest and spiritual father, as part of one’s preparation for Holy Communion.

The canons of the Church exist for the spiritual guidance of the believer toward salvation. Their purpose, therefore, is not to be a penal system which deals legalistically with the non-compliant. Understanding this, we should clearly see with what zeal the Church encourages us toward union with Christ through frequent participation in the Eucharist, and always in a mode of *proper preparation*.

Beloved spiritual children, unless our lives are centered in the Church, we will always find ourselves outside of the spirit of the Holy Canons. In today’s society, we are pulled in

many directions with a myriad of diversions. With this in mind, it is *imperative* for the Orthodox Christian family to never lose its sense of *priority* for Christ's holy Church. Many of us have unfortunately "bought-in" to the variety of reasons to skip church on many, or even most Sundays. In these cases, church has become just another activity in our compartmentalized lives. All secular activities are up on the pedestal, so to speak, and demand, and are given great attention. Church attendance, for many, has become secondary and clearly not as important as secular activities. This is clearly demonstrated through our repeated tardiness for liturgy. In contrast, we make sure that we're not late for such things as work, school, sporting events and practices for our children, because to be late to these things would be *inappropriate, unacceptable, inconsiderate, unthinkable, etc., etc!*

The Church realizes that there are legitimate hardships for many of our people. Please realize that we are not addressing those issues. We would like to bring attention to the fact that many Orthodox Christians today, have not given the Church the priority that it should have in their lives.

If we could even make a small effort to redirect our thinking about the Church, what a difference it could make in our personal and family life. There is so much room for improvement for all of us. **Do we attend church when we "feel" like attending, or when it is "convenient?"** Then let us pray to change this attitude, especially so as not to impart it to our children. **Do we attend church when our children are finished with a seasonal sport?** Then let us be honest with ourselves, and realize the message we have clearly given our children through our consent. **Do we come to church only to get married, bury a loved one, or baptize our children?** Then let us understand that we treat the Church as a department store that serves particular needs, and not as a *life-transforming* necessity in our lives. **Do we stay away because we have created "issues" in our mind regarding the Church, the services, the clergy, certain members of the laity, etc.?** Then let us realize that we have significantly weakened in our faith, to the point that the Evil One and his demons are succeeding in their goal of keeping us from Christ and salvation.

None of what has just been mentioned is impossible to turn around. Living a Christ-centered life is not overly difficult, unbearable, or unattainable. There are many tools available to us, the first of which is *prayer*, which will lead to the conversion of heart and mind. The secular world teaches us to always strive to do better – to be the best we can be, and to never settle for anything less. Beloved in Christ, should not our approach to our Orthodox faith and liturgical life be on par, and even *more* zealous?! Let each one of us, therefore, pick up his cross and follow the road toward salvation – the road that has been opened for us by the holy Body of our Lord – His Church.

PROTECTION OF THE ENVIRONMENT OBSERVATION

A light reception will follow. Please make it a point to attend and be enlightened on the topic, as well as welcome our guests.

REFLECTIONS ON THE HOLY CROSS

(the following is taken from “Orthodox Dogmatic Theology,” by Fr. Michael Pomazansky, St. Herman of Alaska Brotherhood, 1994)

“...it is clear than in the mystery of redemption the Cross and Resurrection of the Lord are inseparable. In the consciousness of the Church this truth is expressed in full measure in the Paschal hymns, which confess the power of the Resurrection of Christ not only for the personal salvation of the Christian, but also in the final, complete justification of the world...By the Cross has been accomplished the cleansing of the sins of the world, the reconciliation with God; by the Resurrection new life has been brought into the world.”

“The Orthodox path of the Christian is the path of the cross and of struggle. In other words, it is the path of patience, of the bearing of sorrows, persecutions for the name of Christ, and dangers from the enemies of Christ, of despising the goods of the world for the sake of Christ, of battling against one’s passions and lusts.”

“Such a path of following Christ was taken by His Apostle. ‘I am crucified with Christ,’ writes the Apostle Paul (Gal. 2:20). ‘God forbid that I should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world (Gal. 6:14)...’”

“All believers are called to struggle according to their strength: ‘They that are Christ’s have crucified the flesh with the passions and lusts (Gal. 5:24).’ The moral life cannot exist without inward battle, without self-restraint. The Apostle writes: ‘For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ; whose end is destruction, whose god is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things (Phil. 3:18-19)...’”

THOUGHTS ON STEWARDSHIP

These statements will function as verification that your pledge card has been received, and also provide you with an opportunity to ensure that your stewardship gifts to date have been properly accounted to you. PROPORTIONATE GIVING

God does not expect more than you can give. Nor does He expect less. Proportional giving is not something unique to the New Testament (1 Corinthians 16:2). Even in the Levitical offerings there was provision for giving according to means. If God had richly blessed you, there was a fitting way to show your gratitude the offering of a young bull. Those not so fortunate could still express their thanks by offering a sheep, a goat, or a bird. But whether the offering was as large as Solomon's (who sacrificed 22,000 oxen and 120,000 sheep at the dedication of the temple (1 Kings 8:36), or as small as Mary's (who brought the offering of the poor, a pair of turtledoves, after the birth of Jesus-Luke 2:24), the important thing was not the size of the gift but the intent of the giver. The poor man's pigeon smelled as sweet to God as the rich man's bull.
