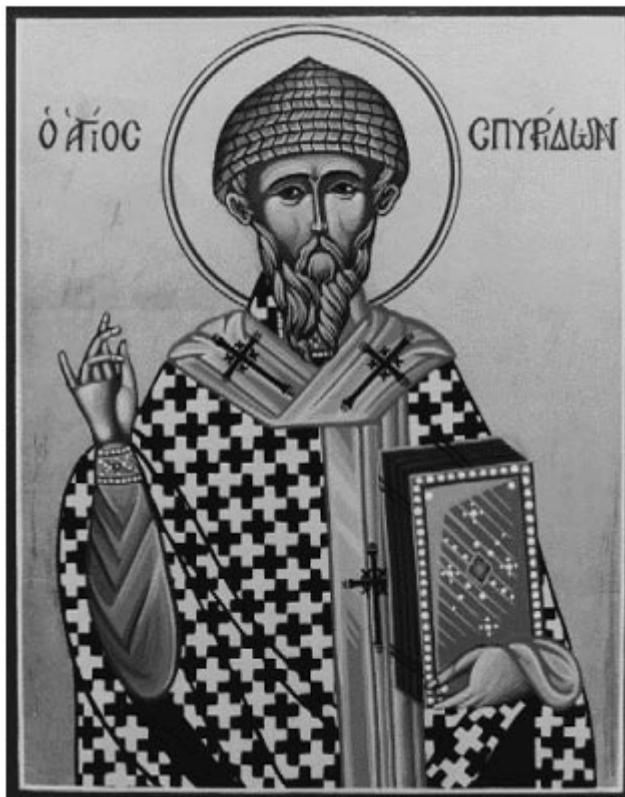

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## FROM THE DESK OF FATHER ANTHONY

Christ is risen!

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, I write this article with mixed emotions. For those who have not heard, I will be leaving St. Spyridon this month in order to assume duties as the new priest of the Annunciation Church of Brockton, MA on July 1<sup>st</sup>. For a priest, it is always difficult to leave his family in Christ with which he has shared so much during his years of serving them. On the other hand, from the day of his ordination, a priest understands and accepts the need to fulfill his calling by heeding the needs of the Church, whatever those needs may be.

Regarding my reassignment, His Eminence Metropolitan Methodios has been informing his clergy for many months now, of upcoming vacancies in the Metropolis due to several priests about to retire, most of whom were serving larger parishes. His Eminence had asked some of us who have now acquired many years of experience, to be prepared to fill these vacancies. Such is the case regarding my assignment to Brockton, in order to unworthily follow the successful ministry of Fr. John Kiramarios, who has served the Annunciation Church for 27 years.

The purpose of this article, however, is not to focus on me, but on *you*, the parishioners of St. Spyridon, and your relationship with your subsequent priest. I hope that over the past seven years I have been able to motivate all of you, to some degree, to strive to be true children of God, and to be visionaries, looking past what you've always known and have been comfortable with. Some of you have shown very clear signs of spiritual growth. Hopefully, other healthy seeds have been sown so that the next "caretaker of the garden" may be able to continue nourishing you, thus promoting growth in Christ.

As you all look forward, you must open your hearts and souls to welcome your new priest, whoever he will be, as your new spiritual father in Christ. In order to have a healthy spiritual relationship with your priest, it is important to always see him in his proper role as your spiritual father and shepherd, leading his flock toward Christ.

Unfortunately, there is a trend with many Orthodox Christians to want to "bring down" the priest to a more "comfortable" level. Perhaps some do this subconsciously in order to avoid the sense of accountability to God and His holy Church. Or perhaps others cannot deal with the fact that a presbyter of God has spiritual charge, through his bishop, over the entire parish.

The fact of the matter is that your priest is *not* a casual friend, or a "buddy". He is actually much *more* than a friend, because as a good shepherd he *loves* his flock, and wants to help everyone stay on the path of Christ. This is hard to comprehend by those who cannot see nor understand their priest in this role. True Christian *agape* is not casual, nor is it "warm and fuzzy" and superficial. It is on a deeper, spiritual level, not manifested as one might perhaps expect.

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There are many ways in which a priest manifests Christ's love for the beloved members of His holy Church: Preaching the Gospel via the teachings of the Holy Apostles and the Holy Fathers of the Church; teaching about Christian morality; admonishing non-Christian-like behavior; conducting the divine services properly without eliminating prayers, which are said for the benefit of all; redirecting misguided actions and behaviors; encouraging a life of prayer, fasting, sacramental participation, and good works; and of course, obvious actions such as visiting the sick and "shut-ins".

Those who can comprehend God's love emanating from these things, will seek to grow in Christ through the spiritual nourishment offered by their priest. Those who cannot, will continually condemn the work of their priest: "*He's too 'strict'; his services are too long; he's not in touch with people living in the real world; I want to feel uplifted when I leave church, and not made to feel bad...*" We all know that we've heard such remarks; in fact, I used to hear such things all the time during my 36 years as a lay person.

Beloved in Christ, the bottom line in spiritually healthy parish life is each member's relationship with Christ and one another. Many of us put too much emphasis on the person of the priest. We should not judge him according to our own personal *expectations* and our own *agendas*. If you immediately begin critiquing your new priest when he arrives, you will be starting off on the wrong foot.

I close by asking all of you to please keep a proper Orthodox perspective with respect to the Church and Her clergy, prior to welcoming you new priest. Each Orthodox parish is the Body of Christ manifested locally, and nothing else. The parish priest stands in the place of his bishop – the "overseer" (*episkopos*) of the parish – so therefore, he is the representative of Christ in the Eucharistic assembly and heads all aspects of parish life. The faithful of the parish *complete* the rest of the Body of Christ.

Parishes are *not* ethno-centric "cultural centers"; they are *not* stages for various factions to play out politics, control battles, or the agendas of select members or of non-church organizations; they are *not* social institutions for people to gather for mere camaraderie, mutually beneficial dealings – business or otherwise – or any other such reason. Your local parish is a sacred vessel heading toward the Second Coming of Christ. On our ship, there is room for many more bodies searching for the True Faith and their salvation. It is up to *all of you*, along with your new priest, to throw open the doors to welcome new members to the Body, so that you may all journey together toward the future. This way, you can further build upon, and strengthen that which has been handed to you from the past generations of Greek Orthodox faithful in the Newport area.

May God bless and protect each and everyone of you as I take leave of my service to you. Please keep me and my family in your prayers, just as I will keep you in mine.

## LITURGICAL SERVICES DURING THE SUMMER

As announced recently in church, Fr. Anthony's last liturgy will be Pentecost Sunday, 6/15. The final two weeks of June will be taken as vacation time prior to assuming duties at the Annunciation Church of Brockton, MA on 7/1. As always, a visiting priest will be sent to St. Spyridon for Sunday services on 6/22 & 6/29, during Fr. Anthony's vacation. At this time there is no information on the assignment of a new priest, therefore, it is not clear whether there will be visiting priests coming after 7/1, if needed. Obviously, the parish will be kept apprised of the situation.

For any emergency situations, funerals, etc., the church secretary and parish council president will make arrangements for a substitute priest. An appropriate message will be recorded by Fr. Anthony on his voice mail, in order to inform callers accordingly.

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## SUMMER HOURS

Please note that for this year, **summer hours will not begin until Pentecost Sunday, 6/15.** We usually change services times on the Sunday following Memorial Day; however, since our religious education program will not end until 6/1, as well as Greek School on 6/8, it makes sense to postpone the time change for the convenience of all the families involved.

## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The May 2008 Parish Council meeting was held on the 6<sup>th</sup> of the month. As you will have seen by now, the church roof has been replaced, with Contractor, B&R Fournier Construction, doing a beautiful job. Thank you to Elaine Holder for overseeing this effort. During the process of the roof repair and chimney repair, it became apparent that the chimneys had not been cleaned in many years, so this cleaning was done at a nominal cost. The outfit which cleaned the chimneys recommended that the church consider getting stainless steel liners. The Parish Council will look into this, but this type of work, if performed, would not occur until the fall. In addition, it appears that the attic over the church hall is not insulated. Mrs. Holder will obtain some estimates for insulation for those areas identified.

UG Nason has ordered the Heat Recovery Unit for installation in the basement. However, this unit has not yet been received. Once received, it will naturally be installed, and the dehumidifiers will be automatically connected to drains. In anticipation of the completion of this work, several estimates are being solicited to make the repairs to the dropped ceiling. By the way, a big THANK YOU to Mr. Kip Cofield for doing such a good job repairing the church office door. It really needed it and works just great now!

The church received \$2800 in donations for Pascha, whereas the bill for the flowers, etc totaled \$2234. Thank you to all parishioners who so generously gave to this effort.

Our Goya chapter performed 2 service activities during Lent, one being the baking of sweet and Lenten bread, the other being to prepare Paschal candles for the youngsters of the community. Both activities were a resounding success, leaving the Goya with an excess of \$547 based upon their sales. The Goya requested that the Parish Council consider allowing them to utilize this funding (which they earned) to take some type of trip or activity. This request was unanimously approved! Well done Goyans, and have fun!!!

Festival Planning is well on its way under the leadership of Steve Mellekas. As always, the difficulty we have every year is finding workers. We truly hope and pray that this

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year will be different. I ask each of you to carefully review your schedules and try to identify a 4 to 6 hour window (or more) whereby you can help your church. In addition, the Festival is in dire need of people who are willing to do the counting of the money and chips. Over the last 5 years or so, this task has fallen to fewer and fewer people. I know from experience that counting the chips and money can be very isolating. Whereas other Festival workers are able to enjoy the music and the sights, the “counters” are not able to appreciate the full festival. Therefore, as a personal favor, I am requesting that we do all we can this year to lessen the burden on the chip/money counters. We need more volunteers in this area so that we can give our loyal “counters” some “shifts” and “time” off. This way, all festival workers will be able to enjoy the festival in some way.

The carnations for Mother’s Day were ordered and picked up by Vice President Chrissy Logothets. Thanks Chrissy!

Peter Petrou commented on the condition of the plantings (or lack of) in the front of the church and that we should try to beautify the areas. As part of the discussions which followed, the undersigned volunteered her sister (Elaine Adamedes Trainor, a licensed Master Gardener) to evaluate the beds in the front of the church and make recommendations to the Parish Council as to what types of plantings make sense for these locations, the placement of these plantings, etc, etc. Elaine (who happily agreed to help our St. Spyridon) will be doing the site survey over the Memorial Day weekend, so we can anticipate a report shortly. The Parish Council recognized that the upkeep of these beds and the plantings would require the expenditure of church funds, unless we obtained parish volunteers. However, I am pleased to report that shortly after the Council meeting a generous steward of our Parish stepped forward and volunteered (anonymously) to take care of these expenses. Thank you so much to this wonderful individual!

The next Parish Council Meeting is scheduled for 7:00 pm on Tuesday, June 3<sup>rd</sup>. Immediately prior to the Council Meeting, the Festival Committee will be holding its first “formal” meeting of the year at 6:00.
