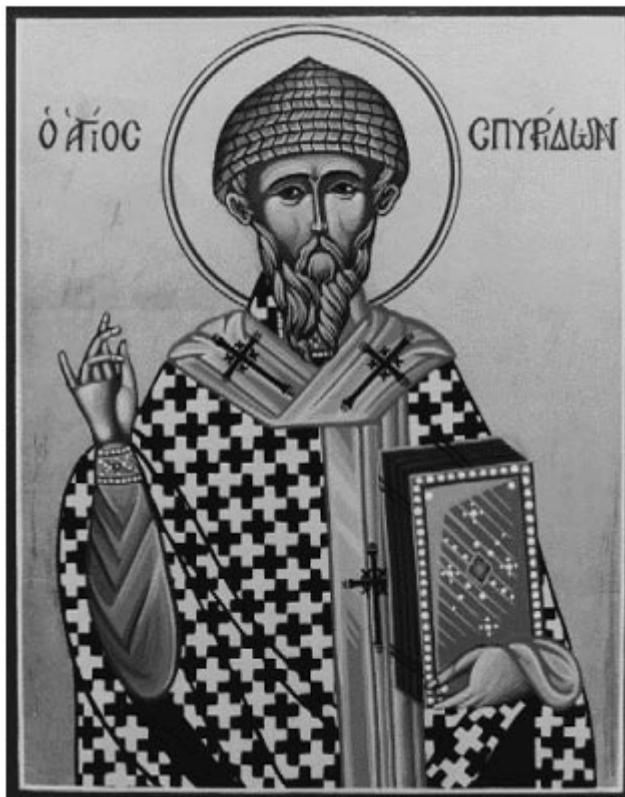

FROM THE PASTOR'S COLLECTION

PENTECOST

Pentecost occurred on the fiftieth (*pentekoste* in Greek) after the Jewish Passover and the fiftieth day after the Resurrection of Christ. This was also a day on which the Jews celebrated a great feast commemorating the giving of the Tables of the Law to Moses on Mount Sinai. Jerusalem was full of foreigners, Jews living abroad (called the “Diaspora”), who had come from all corners of the world to celebrate the feast.

Several days earlier, a group of about one hundred and twenty disciples had gathered together with the apostles and the Theotokos. At Peter’s suggestion they had chosen a twelfth apostle to replace Judas, Matthias.

The disciples were waiting in Jerusalem for the coming of the Comforter whom Jesus had promised. They were full of joyful expectation. They would finally know Him of whom Jesus had said, “It is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him to you” (Jn 16:7). Since Jesus had departed and now sat at the right hand of the Father (Mk 16:19), He could now fulfill His promise.

And so Jesus bestowed the Spirit upon them on the anniversary of the day that Moses had been given the Law, “for the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.” (Jn 1:17).

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all gathered in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance.

Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. And they were amazed and wondered, saying, “Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own language?...We hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God.”

This is the story of Pentecost as told by Luke in the second chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. We also celebrate this event with thanksgiving, singing the troparion of the feast:

*Blessed are Thou, O Christ our God,
Who hast revealed the fisherman as most wise
By sending down upon them the Holy Spirit.
Through them Thou didst draw the world into Thy net.
O Lover of man, glory to Thee!*

HOW TO LOVE YOUR MOTHER—BY TONYA STONEMAN

Mary, the mother of Jesus, stood by the cross at Calvary and witnessed as history’s greatest tragedy was inflicted upon her Son. “When Jesus then saw His mother, and the disciple whom He loved standing nearby, He said to His mother, ‘Woman, behold, your son!’ Then He said to the disciple, ‘Behold, your mother!’ From that hour the disciple took her into his own household” (John 19:26-27).

John the Beloved lived to be an old man—long enough to take good care of Mary all the days of her life. Even as He hung dying on the cross, Jesus demonstrated His love toward His mother, making provision for her care in His absence. The older a mother gets, the more she needs to know that her children still love her.

How can you show love to your mother? **1. Love her Verbally.** When you tell your mother that you love her, it is important to be specific. Tell her why and how you love her. Express some of the qualities for which you love her, like the fact that you enjoy the meals she prepares or you appreciate how dependable she is. When you stop and think about all the things your mother does to serve her household, you will find plenty of examples. **2. Love her physically.** Your mother was the first person to touch you. Before you were born, she wrapped you in her womb. After you came into the world, she kissed your cheeks in the middle of the night and held your little hands. She touched you constantly during all those years when you needed the security of her touch. When her primary duties as a mother have expired, she will need to know that she is still needed. She will need your touch. **3. Love her patiently.** Moms have big jobs. There likely is not corporate responsibility that rivals motherhood when it comes to physical, emotional and spiritual commitment. Sometimes they are late to appointments, prepare meals we don’t like, or don’t follow through the way we expect them to. In these times, we must exercise patience. It’s important to remember that our mothers aren’t bottomless wells from which we draw each time we have a need. Our mothers have their own schedules and needs. It is unfair to expect them to align their lives to accommodate ours. **4. Listen to her.** Can you remember a time when your mother stopped what she was doing to listen to you pour out your burdens? Maybe somebody you were dating stood you up, a friend didn’t invite you to a party, or you didn’t make the basketball team. What did your mother do? She put her arm around you and encouraged you. She listened. Sometimes our mothers long for someone to talk to. A lot of mothers suppress fears, anxieties,



frustrations, and inner torments because they don't want to worry their children. In fact, there are no parents who never have fears, heartaches, or burdens. In her latter years, she may face troubles more intense than anything she has helped you overcome in your life. It is important to keep the door of communication open so our mothers can express their fears when necessary. **5. Love her gratefully.** Think, how many meals did she prepare for you while you lived at home? How many boxes of cereal did she buy? You wanted Corn Flakes, so she bought that. You switched to Lucky Charms, so she bought that. Mothers never bring these things to our attention. They just make their trips to the grocery store and stand in line with their carts full of food because they love us. If we begin to enumerate all the little things that our mothers have done throughout the years, we will realize that we owe them an enormous debt of gratitude. **6. Love her tenderly.** A mother sometimes needs acceptance and understanding rather than a lot of advice. Her actions may seem strange, but when you love somebody, you accept them just as they are. Don't judge your mother—just tenderly love her, and accept that she is going through a difficult time. **7. Love her generously.** More than likely your mother sacrificed so that you could wear the clothes you wore, she made sure that you had the best she could afford first. What was left over she spent on herself. Mothers do this every day with their time and energy. How can we be stingy toward our mothers when they have been so selfless, loving and generous toward us? **8. Love her forgivingly.** Perhaps you do not have a harmonious relationship with your mother. Whatever has happened between you, you have a responsibility before God to forgive her. Maybe there is no excuse for her sins, however, when we do not forgive we cannot love, and God tells us to love. If he can forgive us despite our failures, surely we can do the same for our mothers. **9. Love her cheerfully.** What comes to your mother's mind when she thinks about you? Does she smile or frown? The next time you visit your mother, encourage her, laugh with her, and do your best to make her happy. In doing so, you will show her how you genuinely feel toward her. **10. Love her honorably.** "Honor your father and mother that your days may be long upon earth" (Ex. 20:12 NASB). It is the only one of the 10 Commandments with a built in promise for blessing. When you live the kind of life that honors your mother, she will be proud of you. How do you love your mother? Love her with all of your heart. Demonstrate your love to her in a way that makes her grateful for every moment of time she invested in you, every penny, she sacrificed for you, and every experience she provided that helped you become the person you are.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Christos Anesti! Hristos a inviat! Xristos voskrese!

The Monthly Parish Council meeting was held on Thursday, April 8th. There was no quorum however, various items were discussed. The majority of the meeting had to do with the various repairs being undertaken on the church. These are as follows:

Warranty repair of leak in church roof in the front. (This leak damaged some of the paint underneath the balcony). This will also be repaired.

All American Painting has started work on painting the outside of the church hall. (You may have noticed the scraped paint). They are donating the labor and materials for this work and have promised to have it completed by the Festival.

The exit doors are being repaired to prevent water from blowing in the church.

The sump pumps in the cellar are being replaced.

We are still working on UG Nason for the AC in the church hall.

(With regards to water blowing into the church during storms, we really need to thank God, Panagia and St. Spyridon for preventing catastrophic flooding in our basement. To me, it's another example of a miracle!)

As you may or may not have heard, our dear Father George and Presvytera Elaine are off to Australia to attend (actually officiate) at a nephew's wedding. They will be gone from mid-May to mid-June and we wish them Kalo Taxidi (Safe Trip!). And of course, to hurry back to us soon! During their absence, arrangements will be made for substitute priests to serve our parish. Should an emergency arise during this time, please contact either the church office, or me directly (401-441-0456) so your needs can be taken care of.

The first festival meeting was held, and the next one will be held on 18 May (Tuesday) at the ABC at 7 pm. Please make every effort to attend. The first meeting successfully fleshed out some of the major needs of the festival. The festival dates are the 23rd through the 25th of July. (There are NO changes in these dates). One difference which will be implemented this year is that each booth chairperson will be responsible for getting their own workers. (In the past, sometimes the sign-up sheet in the church hall has not been as effective as possible, resulting in booths opening late due to lack of workers, etc). Also, for those who will not be able to work at the Festival, there will be ample opportunities for you to help to underwrite the costs of the festival by buying certain items (which will be listed in next month's bulletin).

In last month's bulletin, I shared how the children of our community are our treasures, although they can be loud and rambunctious, especially during coffee hours! We all want to encourage our children to become friends with each other (as their friends from church will probably end up being their friends for life!) but lately things have been getting out of hand. Recently, coffee hour food (including frosted cake) was brought downstairs and ended up being dropped and stomped on and ground into the rugs. Our janitor then had to clean up this mess. The Parish Council's concerns, in addition to having

children being hurt during rough-housing, is that food and crumbs, etc can easily attract rodents and naturally we don't want this! Therefore, I would ask of the parents the following:

- Do NOT let your children bring food down into the classrooms, and
- We kindly ask again that parents keep an eye on their kids during this time.

Thanks for your understanding!

With regards to the duties of the Parish Council, not only are we required to attend to the day-to-day administrative needs of the church, (and remain in compliance with the regulations of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America), but each Parish Council member is a FIDUCIARY on behalf of our church. I am not an attorney, but have taken the liberty to utilize the following definitions of the responsibilities of a Fiduciary.

- The FIDUCIARY's duty is a legal AND ethical relationship of confidence between the Parish membership and the Parish Council.
- Fiduciary duties include confidentially, undivided loyalty, obedience, reasonable care and diligence, full disclosure, and accounting to the PARISH. The Parish Council is required to protect to whatever extent is possible the parish, its property, and its assets.
- The Parish Council, as Fiduciaries, must in good conscience act at all times for the sole benefit and interests of the Parish.

Having said this, the Council would like to remind all Parishioners that should an organization wish to utilize the church hall and/or its property for some type of activity, the Council must be notified in writing (or email) with sufficient time so as to allow for discussion of any ramifications of the request and the granting of ultimate permission. I hope you all understand that this reminder is NOT meant in any way to limit the use of the church. In fact, it is to ensure that the church properties are utilized appropriately, with no activities overlapping or interfering with other plans and activities.

And, once again, as a reminder, ANY Parish Council meeting is OPEN to anyone and anyone should feel free to attend whenever you wish. The next Parish Council Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, May 4th at 7:00 pm. I hope to have the final financials from last year (2009) available for the next bulletin (as I promised you last month!!!).
