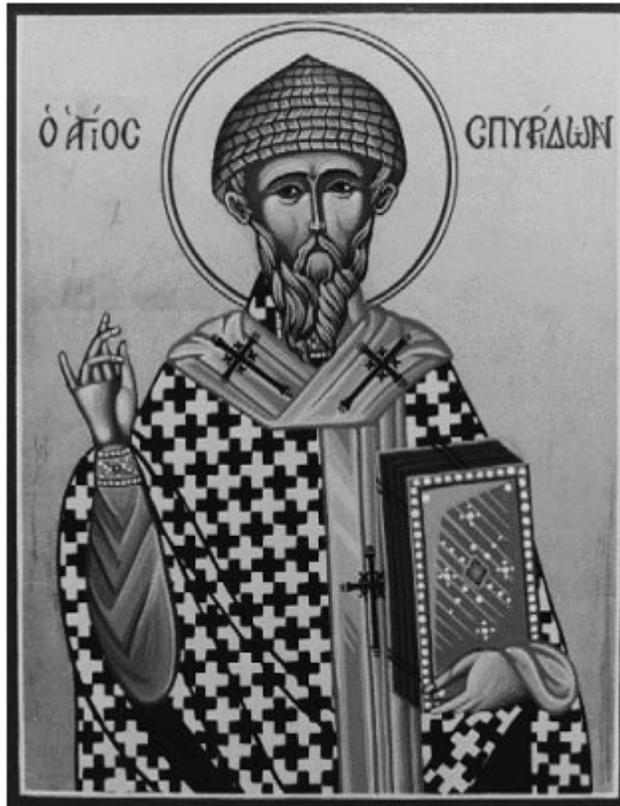

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

SOME THOUGHTS ON THE NEW YEAR

The last words that were found in Sir Walter Scott's dairy were, "Tomorrow, I shall." But there was no tomorrow for him. He died with good intentions to accomplish a particular goal, but he never had the opportunity to either state or accomplish it.

It seems to me that this curious footnote of history is symbolic of all of us. Most of us live with the very best intentions, and with many positive goals; the problem, however, is that we very seldom accomplish any of them. Like that page in Sir Walter's diary, our life is a series of endless pages with plans that are never realized.

Christ knew fully well that it is all too human for us to have lofty ideals but also procrastinate endlessly so that they never become a reality in our lives. That is why the Bible in all its wisdom warns us to be "doers of the word, and not hearers only."(James 1:22)

Plans, goals, and intentions simply don't count; they are not realities, and never will be until we decide to act on them, and to become doers and not only thinkers or hearers. As a new year begins, we are offered a new opportunity to act. Let this be the year that we renew a friendship, visit the lonely, comfort the grieving and be a participant and involved Christian in the worship, the spiritual, the social and the cultural life of our parish. Let this be a new year that does not add to the story of our life another page of unrealized goals, but rather let it be the year in which many of them are accomplished and we are transformed into the doers of God's word.

Ο Χριστός ήξερε ότι ανθρώπινον είναι να έχη κανείς υψηλά φρονήματα και καλές διαθέσεις, αλλά να τα αναβάλλη συνεχώς ώστε ποτέ να μην δούν το φώς της πραγματικότητας στην ζωήν μας. Γιαυτό ακριβώς το Ευαγγέλιο μας λέγει «Γίνεσθε δε εργάτες του λόγου και μη μόνον ακροατές.» (Ιακ. 1.22)

PHILOPTOCHOS



JANUARY FEASTS

Basil the Great, January 1

Saint Basil the Great was born about the end of the year 329 in Caesarea of Cappadocia, to a family renowned for their learning and holiness. His parents' names were Basil and Emily. His mother Emily (commemorated July 19) and his grandmother Macrina (Jan. 14) are Saints of the Church, together with all his brothers and sisters: Macrina, his elder sister (July 19), Gregory of Nyssa (Jan. to), Peter of Sebastia (Jan. 9), and Naucratius. Basil studied in Constantinople under the sophist Libanius, then in Athens, where also he formed a friendship with the young Gregory, a fellow Cappadocian, later called "the Theologian." Through the good influence of his sister Macrina (see July 19), he chose to embrace the ascetical life, abandoning his worldly career. He visited the monks in Egypt, in Palestine, in Syria, and in Mesopotamia, and upon returning to Caesarea, he departed to a hermitage on the Iris River in Pontus, not far from Annesi, where his mother and his sister Macrina were already treading the path of the ascetical life; here he also wrote his ascetical homilies.

About the year 370, when the bishop of his country reposed, he was elected to succeed to his throne and was entrusted with the Church of Christ, which he tended for eight years, living in voluntary poverty and strict asceticism, having no other care than to defend holy Orthodoxy as a worthy successor of the Apostles. The Emperor Valens, and Modestus, the Eparch of the East, who were of one mind with the Arians, tried with threats of exile and of torments to bend the Saint to their own confession, because he was the bastion of Orthodoxy in all Cappadocia, and preserved it from heresy when Arianism was at its strongest. But he set all their malice at naught, and in his willingness to give himself up to every suffering for the sake of the Faith, showed himself to be a martyr by volition. Modestus, amazed at Basil's fearlessness in his presence, said that no one had ever so spoken to him. "Perhaps," answered the Saint, "you have never met a bishop before." The Emperor Valens himself was almost won over by Basil's dignity and wisdom. When Valens' son fell gravely sick, he asked Saint Basil to pray for him. The Saint promised that his son would be restated if Valens agreed to have him baptized by the Orthodox; Valens agreed, Basil prayed, and the son was restored. But afterwards the Emperor had him baptized by Arians, and the child died soon after. Later, Valens, persuaded by his



counsellors, decided to send the Saint into exile because he would not accept the Arians into communion; but his pen broke when he was signing the edict of banishment. He tried a second time and a third, but the same thing happened, so that the Emperor was filled with dread, and tore up the document, and Basil was not banished. The truly great Basil, spent with extreme ascetical practices and continual labours, at the helm of the church, departed to the Lord on the 1st of January, in 379. at the age of forty-nine.

His writings are replete with wisdom and erudition, and rich are these gifts he set forth the doctrines concerning the mysteries both of the creation (see his Hexaemeron) and of the Holy Trinity (see On the Holy Spirit). Because of the majesty and keenness of his eloquence, he is honoured as "the revealer of heavenly things" and "the Great."

Saint Basil is also celebrated on January 30th with Saint Gregory the Theologian and Saint John Chrysostom.

Synaxis of the Three Hierarchs: Basil the Great, Gregory the Theologian, & John Chrysostom, January 30

This common feast of these three teachers was instituted a little before the year 1100, during the reign of the Emperor Alexis I Comnenus, because of a dispute and strife that arose among the notable and virtuous men of that time. Some of them preferred Basil, while others preferred Gregory, and yet others preferred John Chrysostom, quarreling among themselves over which of the three was the greatest. Furthermore, each party, in order to distinguish itself from the others, assumed the name of its preferred Saint; hence, they called themselves Basilians, Gregorians, or Johannites. Desiring to bring an end to the contention, the three Saints appeared together to the saintly John Mavropous, a monk who had been ordained Bishop of Euchaita, a city of Asia Minor, they revealed to him that the glory they have at the throne of God is equal, and told him to compose a common service for the three of them, which he did with great skill and beauty. Saint John of Euchaita (celebrated Oct. 5) is also the composer of the Canon to the Guardian Angel, the Protector of a Man's Life. In his old age, he retired from his episcopal see and again took up the monastic life in a monastery in Constantinople. He reposed during the reign of the aforementioned Emperor Alexis Comnenus (1081-1118).

REFLECTIONS ON THEOPHANY

(The following is taken from The Year of Grace of the Lord, by “a Monk of the Eastern Church”, SVS Press, 1992.)

Epiphany (same as “Theophany”) is the first public manifestation of Christ. At the time of His birth, our Lord was revealed to a few privileged people. Today, all those who surround John, that is to say his own disciples and the crowd that has come to the banks of the Jordan, witness a more solemn manifestation of Jesus Christ. What does the manifestation consist of? It is made up of two aspects. On the one hand, there is the aspect of humility represented by the baptism to which our Lord submits; on the other hand, there is the aspect of glory represented by the human witness that the Precursor (St. John the Forerunner) bears to Jesus, and, on an infinitely higher plane, the divine witness which the Father and the Spirit bear to the Son... Let us bear this in mind: every manifestation of Jesus Christ, both in history and in the inner life of each man, is simultaneously a manifestation of humility and of glory. Whoever tries to separate these two aspects of Christ commits an error which falsifies the whole of spiritual life...

The aspect of humility in Epiphany consists of the fact that Our Lord submits to John’s baptism of repentance... Obviously Jesus had no need to be purified by John, but this baptism conferred by the Precursor, this baptism for the remission of sins, was a preparation for the messianic kingdom; and Jesus, before proclaiming the coming of this kingdom, wished to go through all those preparatory phases which He himself was to ‘consummate’. Being Himself the fullness, He wished to take into Himself all that was still incomplete and unfinished... He who was without sin made Himself the bearer of all our sins, of the sin of the whole world; and it is in the name of all sinners that Jesus made a public act of repentance... As far as we ourselves are concerned, repentance is the aspect of humility in Epiphany. And here we must go beyond the limited horizon of the Johannine baptism and remind ourselves that we have been baptized in Christ. Christian baptism has washed and purified us... Epiphany is, above all, the feast of baptism, not only of Jesus’ baptism, but also of our own. It is a wonderful opportunity for us to renew in spirit the baptism that we received, and to revive the grace which was conferred on us. For the sacramental graces, even if interrupted and suspended by sin, can become alive in us again, if we turn sincerely to God. At this feast of Epiphany, let us ask God to wash us again – spiritually, not actually – in the waters of baptism; let us drown the old, the sinful creature in them, for baptism is a mystical death; let us cross the Red Sea which separates captivity from freedom and let us immerse ourselves with Jesus in the Jordan to be washed not by the Precursor, but by Jesus Himself...

This feast brings us, not only the grace of purification, but also the grace of illumination (in fact, baptism itself was formerly called “illumination”). The light of Christ at Christmas was but a star in the dark night; at Epiphany it appears to us as the rising sun; it will grow and, after the eclipse of Holy Friday, burst forth yet more splendid, on the morning of Easter; and finally, at Pentecost, it will reach its full zenith...
