

ON STEWARDSHIP

“A tithe of everything from the land, whether grain from the soil or fruit from the trees, belongs to the Lord; it is Holy to the LORD” (Lev. 27:30 NIV).

For the most part of my life, tithing was a foreign concept. I never even considered it. Oh, I knew that there were churches that taught and practiced tithing, but they were different and strange. The fact that it was presented so clearly made no difference to me at all. Since it was in the Old Testament, it had no relevance in my life, or so it seemed.

As I have gotten closer to God, I have been aware of the Holy Spirit teaching me and convincing me of the importance of tithing. At first I was uncomfortable with the radical nature of this teaching, but slowly I began to examine it.

The first realization I came to was that my giving was haphazard and undisciplined, and so were my finances. Usually giving was hardly an afterthought for me. If I had anything left over after bills and wants and if I felt like it, I would give. But it was not a priority in my life. The idea that my money was really God’s money just did not occur to me. Learning to tithe and then vowing to tithe has been a life-changing experience for me. I have now learned that God does provide, that He provides more than I need, that He uses me as a vessel to get more of His own money to further His Kingdom, and that His storehouse of blessings is limitless. I am so thankful for this great lesson and for the confirmation of faith that God has provided.

I do not know what our weekly contribution to God’s kingdom would be if all Christians tithed, but my speculation is that it would be more than double what it is now. My encouragement to you is that you seek God’s will for you and ask God about tithing. Ask Him for help and direction in this matter. He will guide you and give you His will, and you will be enabled to do His will.

EVENTS OF NOVEMBER

The Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple

Since Joachim and Anna, parents of the Theotokos, had been childless for a long time, Anna prayed that she would dedicate her future child to the Temple of God. When the Theotokos was three years old, she was taken in a procession to the temple. Her parents, relatives, and maidens, all bearing candles, lead the way to the first step of the temple, she ran up the remaining fourteen steps. John the Baptist's father, Zacharias, took her by the hand into the temple, and by divine inspiration also past the second curtain in the Holy of Holies, where only the high priest enters but once a year. Joachim and Anna visited her often until their death. The Theotokos wished to remain a virgin in the temple her entire life. However, the Jewish law would not permit this, nor had this ever been heard of. For this reason, Zacharias chose an elderly relative to whom she was betrothed but not married, to protect her virginity. Her parents were buried at the base of the Garden of Gethsemane about fifty steps down a cement staircase, and the empty tomb of the Theotokos is again fifty steps below this.



Holy Unmercenaries Cosmas & Damian


There have been three pairs of unmercenaries who have become saints in Orthodoxy. All three have been physicians, and they have healed without charge and for the glory of god, and for this reason have been called unmercenaries. Coincidentally, they have all been named Cosmas & Damianos. The two who are commemorated today were the first of those three pairs. The second pair is celebrated on July 1, and the third pair on October 17. These two celebrated today were brothers from Asia Minor and were raised as Christians by their mother. The money for their own needs was from their parents' estate. Cosmas once became extremely upset when his brother received three eggs



from a patient, even though she has sworn an oath that he would have them. The brother believed that "of the most high comes most healing." God gave them the gift of working miracles by their prayers as well. They both died peacefully. Even then, calling on the saints for intercession has worked miracles. A python had wrapped itself around a worker while he slept, covering his mouth and his stomach. When in desperation he called upon the saints, he was spared.

Andrew the First-Called Apostle

Andrew was at first a disciple of Saint John the Baptist along with Saint John the Theologian. When the Forerunner pointed out Jesus, they both became His disciples. After Pentecost, Andrew taught in Byzantium, Thrace, Russia, Epiros, and Peloponnesos. In Amisos, he converted the Jews in the temple, baptized them, healed their sick, built a church and left a priest for them. In Sinope, he prayed for the imprisoned Apostle Matthias, and his chains fell from him and the cell door opened. The people beat Andrew, breaking his teeth, cutting his fingers, and left him for dead in a dung heap. Jesus appeared to him and healed him, telling him to be of good cheer. When the people saw him the next day, they were amazed and believed. In Patras, Andrew healed the wife of the proconsul Aegeates of an incurable disease. The Proconsul Aegeates' family believed in the miracles and preaching of St. Andrew, and the enraged Proconsul tortured and crucified St. Andrew. St. Andrew did not find himself worthy enough to die in the same manner as Christ, and requested that he be crucified upon an "X-shaped" cross. The new converts wanted to remove him from his cross, but the saint would not allow them. Instead, he comforted them from the cross and as he prayed an extraordinary light encompassed him for about a half hour. When it left, he gave up his soul. It was the year 62 AD.

ARCHANGELS MICHAEL AND GABRIEL AND ALL THE ANGELS

On the 8th of November we celebrate the memory of the Archangels Michael and Gabriel and all the angels. This is a beautiful feast which we should see as our own personal feast because a very close acquaintance - in fact, an inseparable friend - is celebrating his name day: our guardian angel. Especially here in the U.S. over against the culture of Halloween, where so much interest is shown in "spirits" and "ghosts" - even bad spirits and "scary" ghosts - it is good to contemplate the positive influence of angels on our life and to see what the Church says about these good spirits.

According to the Church's teaching God created only two types of being endowed with freedom: the angels and human beings. Whereas the human beings participate in both the material and spiritual world, the angels, because they do not have a physical body are immaterial beings. But despite their "non-physicality" they are a powerful presence in our "physical" lives because everything "physical" has a "spiritual" aspect (the dualists, who would separate these two were an early heresy condemned by the Church). So we learn that they stand beside us as an invisible protection in our good and bad moments day and night. They encourage and support us, indeed, sometimes they need to hold us back from danger and bad decisions, they intercede to God for us and they are grieved by our mistakes. The very fact that we each have a guardian angel is a great privilege, an indication of the great love that God has for mankind. Who can compare the bodyguards of today's V.I.P.'s with one of these guardian angels?

Indeed, the Bible is full of references to the angels. For example, there is the angel who sent news to Zachariah that his son John the Baptist was to be born. Everyone is also familiar with the Annunciation Gospel account where the Archangel Gabriel announces (hence Annunciation) the good news to the Panagia that she would bear the very son of God in her womb. The Archangel Gabriel is also the angel depicted in the nativity icon, bending over from on high in a gesture of caring love for mankind.

The Lord himself had frequent communication with the angels. The account of his temptation by the devil comes to mind when he withdrew to the desert before beginning his ministry. After being tempted the "angels came and ministered to him."

And in many other instances the Lord reminds us of the angels and their role in our life "you will from now see the heavens opened and the angels of God ascending and

descending on the Son of God ..." and, speaking about the humble. "...whoever confesses my name to men the Son of Man will also confess his name in the presence of the angels of God..." and "truly, truly I say to you, there is more joy amongst the angels of God over one sinner who repents ...".

Our entire Christian life from the time of our baptism when the angels surround the baptismal font in great joy for the neophyte about to be incorporated as new member of the Church, all the way to our final moments when they accompany our soul to the Just Judge, is connected with the angelic presence.

Indeed, our Lord stresses their role at the end times: "...and he will send his angels with a great cry of the trumpet and he will gather his elect ..."

In our everyday life, even without realizing it, according to the teaching of the Church, they are always invisibly with us. For this reason the Church has a special day each week dedicated to the memory of the angels: every Monday of the year is dedicated to the angels according to the liturgical cycle of the Church. The special or troparion sung in honor of the Archangels on November 8th goes as follows: "Supreme Commanders of the Hosts of the Heavens, we, the unworthy, importunately beseech you that by your supplications you encircle us in the shelter of the wings of your immaterial glory, guarding us who now fall down and cry to you with fervor: Deliver us from dangers of all kinds, as the great marshals of the heavenly hosts on high." Every evening according to the full Orthodox prayer cycle, the last prayer of the last service of the day - the Compline service - is directed to our guardian angel. The faithful, before laying his head for sleep turns with tender trust to his heavenly friend and directs his final petitions of the day: "Holy Angel, ... take me by the hand, and lead me in the way of salvation ... forgive me of all things I have done that have troubled you all the days of my life, and if I have sinned in anything on this day ... shelter me in this present night, and keep me from every affront of the enemy ... and intercede with the Lord on my behalf!"

What a beautiful thing it is for us to remember the presence of these God-sent ambassadors rather than wasting time or interest in "spooky" bad spirits. May these heavenly friends cover, protect and intercede for all of you. Have a blessed month of November always remembering their presence in our lives.

Each steward will be receiving a mailing, including a budget for the upcoming year, as well as a look at how we did financially this year. Please make every effort to attend this important meeting.

On Sunday, November 20th, an afternoon of Rebetiko music will be held (time and place to be determined). Approximately 8 to 10 musicians have generously offered to play for our Parish Family following their annual weekend music retreat. This will be a real treat and I'm sure a great afternoon. On a purely voluntary basis, the Parish will be initiating a "One Parish/One Book" program. Here's how it works: you sign up and then get a copy of the book (you can either order the book yourself, or the church will be placing a bulk order). Then, read the book at your leisure. I'm sure that we will all find something in the book that we didn't know about our Orthodox faith, and better yet, it will give us something that we can discuss together on an informal basis (during coffee hour, at the supermarket, on Facebook, etc). Perhaps on a few Sundays after church, a more formal discussion will be held—we'll just play it by ear. dersigned and let us know if you would like the church to order the book for you. The next Parish Council Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov 1st at 7:00 pm.
