FROM THE PASTOR'S COLLECTION

October Archpastoral Reflection from His Eminence

The story is told about a number of frogs which were placed by scientists in a tub of water whose temperature was exactly the same as the pond from which they were taken. The scientists slowly increased the temperature and were soon astonished to see that, even though the water gradually became warmer, the frogs did not react. It was only when the temperatures were increased to a boiling point that the frogs reacted. It was too late. Before they knew it, they burned to death. Had they realized the slow increase in the water temperature, they would have reacted and thus spared their lives. The frogs grew accustomed to the slow rise in temperature and adapted. The change in water temperature occurred slowly but deliberately, and because of this process, the frogs failed to pay attention.

For us Orthodox Christians, the changes in the moral standards in our society have occurred so slowly that they have become imperceptible. We have adapted to the slow deterioration of moral life in society to the point where we have adapted to the moral decay in our midst and have taken it for granted. Sadly we live in a world of moral and ethical relativism, hedonism and selfishness; in a world in desperate need of spiritual renewal.

Sunday is no longer the day that we worship Almighty God and then sit at our dinner table to enjoy fellowship. Rarely do we read the Bible. Prayers are no longer offered in our schools. The Ten Commandments have been removed from our civil courts. Lifestyles previously kept in the closet are now championed as reputable and worthy of emulation. The other day while driving to a liturgical service, a fellow priest pointed to a decal placed prominently on the bumper of the car in front of us. It was the symbol of a new atheist group in America.

The admonition of Saint Paul addressed to the Ephesians should echo in our hearts, "no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their minds." (Eph.4:17) We need to re evaluate our lives and ask ourselves how the way we live differs from the way others live who have no faith. Do we differ as Orthodox Christians from our secular and oftentimes atheist neighbors? How do we live our Orthodox Faith?

I am concerned that we have become so accustomed to sin and immoral behavior, that we do not notice it. We must not accept the prevailing permissive immoral and unethical standards of modern day society which are clearly at odds with the tenets of Holy Scripture and the teachings of the Fathers of the Church.

Remember the frogs in the experiment, and be wary of their mistake of growing accustomed to an environment which eventually caused their demise.

So there is always an ample opportunity to bring forward your concerns.

We all need to be reminded that we are in this together. Our parish sinks or swims based upon how well we work TOGETHER. We need to recognize that each of us have been given unique gifts by God, and that each gift is of value, and most importantly, that we bear the likeness of Christ in each and every one of us, if only we would take the time to look.

So how should we deal with each other? With Grace and Love (Gal. 5:6)-This is how God has chosen to deal with us, so pass it on!

Η 28η ΟΚΤΩΒΡΙΟΥ ΣΑΝ ΜΙΑ ΠΑΓΚΟΣΜΙΑ ΙΣΤΟΡΙΚΉ ΕΠΕΤΕΊΟΣ

Ή 28η Οκτωβρίου, 1940 εἶναι μιά ἀπό τίς ἱστορικότερες ἡμέρες τῆς όμογένειάς μας, καί ἴσως ὅλης τῆς Εὐρώπης. Εἶναι ἡμέρα πού ἔχει συνδέσει ἄρρηκτα τήν σύγχρονη ὁμογένεια μέ τήν ὁμογένεια τοῦ Πλάτωνα καί τοῦ Εὐριπίδη.

Τά πολεμικά κύματα είχαν πλημμυρίσει ὅλη την Εύρώπη. "Ολα σχεδόν τά κράτη της, ἄλλα είχαν γονατίσει φοβισμένα καί ἄλλα ὑποχωροῦσαν σέ δουλική οὐδετερότητα, τό ἕνα μετά τό ἄλλο.

Καί μόνον ο Ελληνικός λαός, μετά από τήν Αγγλία, πού βάσταζε όλο τό βάρος καί πολεμοῦσε γιά τήν ἀνθρωπότητα, σήκωσε τό μέτωπο καί εἶπε μέ ἔνα ἰστορικό ΟΧΙ, ὅτι θά ἔπαιζε καί τήν ὅπαρξή του ἀκόμα γιὰ τό καλό ὅλου τοῦ κόσμου.

Καί ὁ κόσμος ὅλος περίεργος καί κατάπληκτος, περίμενε νά δεῖ μέχρι ποιοῦ σημείου θά ἄντεχε ἡ ὁμογένεια. Καί ὁ ἀγῶνας τῆς ὁμογένειας σ΄ αυτό ἀκριβῶς τὸ σημείο ἀπόκτησε τραγικό μεγαλεῖο. Παρ 'ὅλην τήν ἀνισότητα καί τήν ἔλλειψη τῶν σύγχρονων πολεμικῶν μέσων, ἀπαντοῦσε, μικρή ὅπως ἦταν, σέ μιά τεράστια πρατιωτική δύναμη μέ τὸ "Μολών λαβέ". Καί ἔτσι ἔδειχνε σέ ὅλο τόν κόσμο τὸν δρόμο τῶν ἔλεύθερων καί ἀδούλωτων ἀνθρώπων, καί μέ τὸ δίδαγμά της αὐτό ἔμπαινε γιά μιά ἀκόμα φορά στήν ἀθανασία.

Αδιαφορούσε τί θά ήταν τό αποτέλεσμα καί διαλέγοντας τόν δρόμο τής τιμής, ἔμπαινε στήν ιστορία τῶν ἀθάνατων. Ἡξερε ὅτι ὁ ἀγῶνας θά ήταν πολύ σκληρός, γεμάτος ἀπό δοκιμασίες, ἀλλά ήταν ἐνωμένη μέ τήν ἀπόφασή της νά κερδίσει τόν τελικό θρίαμβο.

Είχε μπροστά της ενδοξη καί πρωτοφανή ἱστορία πού δέν μπορούσε νά προδώσει, πού δέν μπορούσε νά άφίσει. Καί στά βουνά τῆς 'Ελληνικῆς' Ηπείρου, τό μικρό κράτος μέ τά 9 έκατομμύρια, ἀπόκρουσε μέ νίκη τίς πολυάριθμες ὁρδές τοῦ Φασισμοῦ. Καί ὅταν ἀργότερα μιά ἄλλη μεγάλη δύναμη, ἡ Ναζιστική Γερμανία, τοῦ ἔκανε ἐπίθεση, καί κεῖ ἀντιστάθηκε. 'Αντιστάθηκε καί ἀναποδογύρισε τά σχέδια τοῦ Αξονα, καί ἄλλαξε τήν πορεία τοῦ Δεύτερου Παγκόσμιου Πολέμου.

Δέν θά ήταν υπερβολή ή καί ψέμμα νά πουμε ότι: "Αν δέν κέρδισε μόνη της ή Ελλάδα τόν Παγκόσμιο Πόλεμο, πάντως πάρα πολύ είχε νά κάνει μέ τήν τελική νίκη. Συντέλεσε στό νά σωθεί ή Μεσόγειος καί νά μείνει ἀπρόσιτη ή Μέση Ανατολή. 'Η Ρωσσία πῆρε καιρό νά προετοιμασθεί χάρη στήν ἀντίσταση τῆς 'Ελλάδας. 'Η 'Ισπανία ἀρνήθηκε νά βοηθήσει τόν "Αξονα καί νά παραδώσει τό Γιβραλτάρ, καί ή 'Αμερική ἐτοιμάσθηκε καλύτερα.

"Ολοι πήραν θάρρος καί μαθήματα από τήν μικρή Ελλάδα και οι δυό δικτάτορες, ὁ Χίτλερ και ὁ Μουσσολίνι, ἀναγκάσθηκαν νά τροποποιήσουν τά σχέδιά τους. Τό Ελληνικό τόλμημα τῆς 28ης 'Οκτωβρίου, 1940 ἄλλαξε τή πορεία τοῦ πολέμου και τίς ἐπιχειρήσεις τοῦ "Αξονα γιά πάντα.

Αὐτή εἶναι ή σημασία τῆς 28ης Όκτωβρίου. Αὐτη εἶναι ή μεγάλη ἐπέτειος πού γιορτάζουμε σήμερα.

Είναι έξαιρετικά μεγάλη καί έξαιρετικά ἱστορική ή ἐπέτειος αὐτή πού μᾶς θυμίζει τό "μολών λαβέ" τοῦ Λεωνίδα καί τό "όχι" τοῦ Μεταξᾶ, Είναι ἐξαιρετικά χαρακτηριστική ή 28η Οκτωβρίου, 1940 όχι μόνο γιά μᾶς τούς όμογενεῖς, ἀλλά καί γιά ὅλους τούς πολιτισμένους ἀνθρώπους πού μιλοῦν μέ θαυμασμό γιά τό κατόρθωμα τοῦ 1940.

THE TRUE PRAGMATISM BY FR. COSTIN POPESCU

We live in an age of pragmatism. We value action, results, efficiency. There is not much time left for contemplation, and yet very few things are accepted without questioning.

It is important therefore to address head-on a set of important issues that have to do with the very reason of existence of the Church: why do we need a church? What is the special role of the priest? Why isn't the local parish sufficient? Do we need a bishop? All these questions have clear, logical answers, and all these answers are closely connected, as we will presently see.

We all value life. Unfortunately, our biological life is limited, and there is little we can do about it. Seventy, eighty years is all that these bodies can sustain (Ps. 89:10). If there is an alternative to the finality of death, it is definitely worth pursuing, even for the most pragmatic amongst ourselves.

This alternative exists indeed, and has been called salvation from eternal death, redemption from the tyranny of sin. There can be no salvation without a Savior, no redemption without a Redeemer, and that Savior and Redeemer is our Lord Jesus Christ. Only the Son of God can defeat the power of death, and therefore only in Him can we, limited, mortal beings, attain to Immortality.

To put this in the simplest way, we can only overcome death by being joined to Christ in one mystical Body. This Body is called the Church, and it extends both geographically and historically. It even extends beyond the earthly level of existence to include the saints that live with the Lord. We become members of this Body when we are baptized, and we are further joined to it whenever we eat the Body and drink the Blood of Christ in the Holy Eucharist.

Life in Christ is therefore a journey, and we cannot undertake it by ourselves. We need specialized guides that bring us into God's presence in the Mysteries of Church. This is the role assigned by God to the priests. The priests have no special powers of their own: it is always the Power of God that is at work. Nevertheless, in His benevolence that surpasses all understanding, God has allowed humble human beings to have access to His unlimited power, for the benefit of the whole Body.

It is essential to pause here and realize that it is God who elects His priests, and that they work for the benefit of the *whole* Body. The individual Christian, the Christian family and even the local parish, while being essential members of the Body, are not the whole Body.

A priest therefore does not merely seve individuals, families or even his parish, but always the Church as a whole.

To make this reality concrete, the Holy Spirit has instructed the Apostolic Church to assign a bishop, or overseer (*episkopos*) for every area, as embodiment of the oneness of the church. The priests, or elders (*presbyteroi*), represent the variety of gifts, and function as a council to the bishop. There can be no Church without a bishop, just as there can be no Church without priests, and there can be no Church without the people of God.

If we want to partake of the Eternal Life in Christ, we need to become familiar with this inner logic of the mystical Body, as designed by God and "take advantage" (pragmatically speaking) of its inner workings. We need to rediscover the tremendous healing and transformational power of the Divine Mysteries of Repentance/Confession, Holy Unction and Holy Eucharist. We need to develop a close relationship with the spiritual guide (most often our parish priest, or any other priest who has received the special blessing to hear confession), because the journey is long and arduous. We also need to experience the Church as a whole, beyond the limits of the parish.

This is why we, the clergy, have regular meetings of the Brotherhood, where we become attuned to one another and receive the guidance of our bishop, His Eminence Metropolitan Methodios. It is our hope that we can speak to you as a Brotherhood through these monthly messages.

The best way, however, to experience the Church as a whole is through direct participation in inter-church and Metropolis-wide activities: Choir Federation, Metropolis Philoptochos, DOXA Conferences, Young Professional gatherings would be a few examples. Those of you who want to take the next step and be fully immersed in the reality of the Church as a whole should take advantage of family camps and other retreats at St. Methodios Faith and Heritage Center, one of the best facilities of its kind in the country. Hundreds of families have already gone through such retreats, and they can share with you how incredible the experience of life in Christ can be when practiced thoroughly, even for a few days.

Rejoice, therefore, for being joined to Christ for all eternity! Believe in Him, and you shall have everlasting life (John 3:16)! Become an active member of Christ's Mystical Body by exploring all that the church has to offer. Then and only then you will be entitled to call yourself a true pragmatist. Amen!

SAINTS TO KNOW

As faithful Orthodox Christians, it is important that we know who the people we commemorate are, as well as what they have contributed to the body of Christ. This month I would like us all to remember Sts Demetrios and Nestor, who we remember on October 26th & 27th, respectively.

The names of Demetrios and Nestor are so linked in the annals of Christianity that it would be almost sacrilegious to mention one without the other in any account of the story of these two beloved men of God, who are now as in inseparable in church archives as they were in life. It was their combined defiance of the early fourth-century tyranny which brought them to a martyrdom, which individually they may not have attained, but which places them on equal footing in the final judgment. While Demetrios was the better



known of the two, it was the quiet courage of his friend, Nestor, added to the complete piety of Demetrios, that assured their immortality.

Demetrios was a native of the city of Thessaloniki, the city founded by Alexander the Great, who named it for a sister very dear to him. In the tradition of the great thinkers of ancient Greece, Demetrios honed his keen oratorical power in the public forum, where the debates of the great minds of the day drew the spirited Christians as much as the gladiatorial games attracted the pagans. As the second leading city of the empire, Thessaloniki had a reputation for providing the brightest intellectuals on the public platform and the most fearsome gladiators in the arena, strange bedfellows, indeed, and oddly enough, in both of which the power of Demetrios was to find expression.

Demetrios was in the military service as well as a devout Christian, as study in contrast that was countenanced in Thessaloniki, but when it came to the attention of the Emperor Maximinus, who had come for an annual exhibition of gladiatorial prowess in the arena, the dual nature met with royal displeasure. For his part in the Christian cause, Demetrios was stripped of his military rank and cast into prison to await a certain fate. It was at this point that the friendship of Nestor came to light. At great personal risk Nestor visited his friend in prison regularly and sought to intercede oh his behalf, a move which availed him little but aroused suspicions of those who surrounded the emperor. This provided the setting for one of the finest displays of the power of God through the friendship of two gallant Christians.

It seems that one of the favorites of the arena, admired particularly by the emperor, was a giant man name Lyaios, a seventeen foot brute who destroyed every hapless gladiator he ever faced, and for whom the pagans sought an opponent who at least had the courage to walk up to Lyaios and give a good account of himself before succumbing to the inevitable. It was during one of the visits that Nestor heard from Demetrios that the power of the Lord could be transmitted through him to any man and make him invincible against any foe in the arena. The youthful Nestor, with the spirit of a true believer welling within him, agreed to hurl a challenge of the best of the gladiators with a declaration that the power of God would, thanks to his friend, Demetrios, prevail against all

comers. Buoyed by the assurance of Demetrios, he stepped into the arena and shouted his defiance in the name of the Lord.

The pagan crowd, thinking this some practical joke, roared with laughter, but when Nestor strode to the royal box where Maximinus had looked on with amusement and heard the young man invoke the name of Demetrios and the awesome power of God, his smile turned into a snarl and the audience joined him in derision, whereupon the scowling Lyaios was brought into the pit. The crowd settled back to witness the anticipated cat and mouse match, which the giant would conclude when it pleased him. But they were brought to their feet in disbelief when the supposed victim withstood the withering attack of the gladiator who had never tasted defeat, and, in due course, turned the tables while soundly defeating the greatest of gladiators. Nestor scorned the thumbs down signal of the mob who now screamed for death, and the young Christian walked away from his prostrated foe. The frustrated emperor then ordered the deaths of both Christian companions, without delay, by the Roman soldiers. Not all who left the arena that day remained pagans.
